LGC Crews to the Rescue on Oakland County Water Main Break

Fast Action on Repairs Receives Praise from local Government Officials



It was no surprise that The Great Lakes Water Authority (GLWA) called on Lakeshore Global Corporation (LGC) when an emergency occurred near the intersection of Halsted and 14 Mile Road in Farmington Hills. A broken water main was flooding streets and causing very low water pressure in homes. Several suburban communities north of Detroit were affected including Novi, Northville, Walled Lake, West Bloomfield, Farmington Hills, Keego Harbor, Sylvan Lake, Commerce Township and Bloomfield Township. Approximately 340,000 customers were affected. It could have turned

into something much worse, but the quick response averted a major catastrophe according to Farmington Hills City Manager David Boyer.

"I was actually in Texas when it happened so I rushed back because it was a public safety issue. We were so impressed

with how quickly the crews arrived. The coordination between GLWA, LGC and surrounding communities was really impressive. Under the old system, prior to the establishment of the GLWA, it would have taken a lot longer to get started and to finish. We are sending a big shout out to the team for getting the work done in record time. Our residents are not complaining about the brief inconvenience."

Within an hour our project manager had put together a crew prepared to work long hours to do whatever was necessary to meet the client's needs. We have rehabilitated aging school buildings within the Detroit Public School Community District.

LGC has proven track record of repairing and replacing broken water and sewer pipes. It is one of the company's major areas of expertise. It is GLWA's designated contractor for emergency task force water main repairs. The call for help came in around 6:30pm on October 23, 201. LGC teams were on the scene within an hour with tools, equipment and the skills to isolate the water that was being spilled by closing off the valves. Crews worked around the clock on 12 hour shifts in the dark and muddy section of the affected roads. Water was shut completely off to 51,000 homes in certain communities, and a boil water advisory was issued for others. Residents were encouraged to use bottled water to avoid contamination.

By 6pm the next day, less than 24 hours after the crisis began, all of the dirt and asphalt had been dug up and the excavation process was complete. The next step in the process was the removal of the broken pipe. A 48" pre-stressed concrete pipe had broken and a replacement was brought in from Illinois.

Unemployment and poverty have been the twin thorns in the side of the city's ability to effectively convince many Detroit residents that progress is being made. Our management team at Lakeshore Global Corporation is convinced that Detroit is making a strong comeback by re-building a tax base that had long been shrinking. New businesses Downtown, Midtown, Corktown and other pockets of the city are opening up at a record

Midtown Detroit Inc. Moving Rapidly with Construction and Rehab of Vacant Buildings

The view down Woodward Avenue headed toward downtown Detroit is looking far different from the run-down and scantily occupied buildings that once were vibrant. The good news is that the area is visibly improving at a fast rate which means new businesses and residential units are on schedule to open. According to Executive Director of

Midtown Detroit, Inc. Sue Mosey, a lot is going on, and it means improved surroundings to one of its neighboring anchors, Lakeshore Global Corporation. "We (Midtown Detroit, Inc.) own a lot of the buildings on the West side of Woodward. We just sold the old Woolworth building to a developer out of Philadelphia, and we're really proud of the finished construction at 6568 Woodward which is a 30,000 square foot building on the corner of Grand Blvd. on the Q Line, and just across the street from Lakeshore Global Corp."

The refurbished building is now painted in an attractive orange hue and will house the Wilson Foundation Non-Profit organization on the entire second floor. The third floor consists of ten residential units that are already leased. Seven of the 10 units are priced at market rate, and the remaining 3 are designated for low-income. The ground floor will house a new 2,000 sq. ft. restaurant with a corner entrance. Details on the restaurant are not yet being released.
